In March 2011, WCET (WICHE Cooperative for Educational Technologies) created the State Authorization Network (SAN) to serve institutions and organizations nationwide by providing training, support, and opportunities to collaborate to navigate regulatory compliance for outof-state activities of post-secondary institutions. Institutions offering courses and/or programs out-of-state that lead to professional licensure or certification must determine whether the courses and/or programs meet the prerequisites for licensure or certification in the states where they are being offered and provide notification of these findings.

STATE LICENSURE DISCLOSURES

Potential students/graduates must know whether a program they are enrolling in or graduated from meets the requirements for them to obtain a professional practice license in the jurisdiction where they intend to practice



Professional Licensure Landscape

- Mobility of professionals
- Increased licensed professions
- Alternative pathways to licensure
- Upsurge of certifications
- Lack of relationship between state authorization and professional licensing boards

Role of State Regulators (from a DC perspective)

Serve as a liaison between the institution and the Commission

Respond to general inquiries from applicants

Review the application submission

Conduct site visits to institutions

Compose report and submit to the Commission along with the institutional application for their review

Investigate complaints or other matters of non-compliance

Implement the decision of the Commission


What is SARA?

SARA is an agreement among member states, districts, and territories that establishes comparable national standards for interstate offering of post secondary distance education.




NC-SARA

SARA Landscape







NC-SARA already has policies in place addressing disclosures related to professional licensure programs. The <u>SARA Manual</u> Policy Section 5.2 addresses requirements for notifying students in writing whether a course or program meets the educational requirements for professional licensure where the students are located.

Purpose of Federal Regulations: Professional Licensure Disclosures for Post-Secondary Institutions

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Purpose:

• Provide Transparency for Consumer Protection

Why:

• Ensure student financial investment in education and training will prepare the student to pursue their chosen profession.

Key Requirements:

- For Programs Leading to Professional Licensure or Certification.
- For all modes of instruction (face to face & distance education).
- Institutions must provide general and direct disclosures to students.



General Disclosure Specifics in the Federal Regulations: Professional Licensure Disclosures for Post-Secondary Institutions

General Disclosure Specifics:

- Make available to all prospective and enrolled students.
- Lists of states about curriculum meeting the educational requirements in the states.
 - List where the curriculum meets educational requirements.
 - List where the curriculum does not meet educational requirements.
 - List where the institution has not made a determination.



Direct Disclosure Specifics in the Federal Regulations: Professional Licensure Disclosures for Post-Secondary Institutions

Direct Disclosure Specifics:

- In writing to the student. (email ok!)
- If the curriculum does not meet state requirements or institution has not made a determination.
- Where the student is located prior to enrollment or for the enrolled student within 14 days of the institution determining the curriculum does not meet the state requirements.

INSTITUTIONS NEED STATE PROFESSIONAL BOARD HELP TO COMPLY! Professional Licensure Disclosures for Post-Secondary Institutions

Institutions need help from state professional boards.

Why?

Institutions must be able to review each state's requirements to analyze and make an assessment.

What do institutions need?

Clear Access to the state requirements.



What can CLEAR Members Do to Collaborate in this Process? Professional Licensure Disclosures for Post-Secondary Institutions

What can CLEAR Members Do to Collaborate in this Process?

- Communicate with Professional Boards.
- Encourage State professional boards to make their educational requirements clear and obvious on their websites.
- Encourage State professional boards to develop a process to manage the influx of inquiries from post-secondary institutions.
- Remember & share that the purpose of these inquiries is to support students that are the future professionals in these fields.
